Curriculum Vitae

Ellen Dingemans was born on May 11, 1986 in Kaatsheuvel, the Netherlands. She studied at Tilburg University and obtained her Bachelor's degree in Sociology (cum laude) in 2010. During this study period, she participated in the Honors program and worked as a student assistant at the Methods and Statistics department. In 2010, she received an Excellence Scholarship, awarded by Tilburg University, for her outstanding study results. She continued to study at Tilburg University and finished her Research Master in Social and Behavioral Sciences (cum laude) in 2012. As part of this Master program, she participated in the Essex Summer School 2011 in a course on panel data analysis. For her master thesis, Ellen received the Netspar Research Master Thesis Award 2013, awarded by the Netspar consortium. During her studies, she was involved in several research traineeships at the Ministry of Justice (WODC), the Social and Cultural Planning office (SCP) and the Netherlands Interdisciplinary Demographic Institute (NIDI-KNAW).

In 2012, together with Prof. Kène Henkens, Ellen received a NWO Research Talent Grant, which offered her the opportunity to conduct PhD research at NIDI. She presented her research at various national and international conferences, such as the Dag van de Sociologie (2012 and 2014), the Dutch Demography Day (2012, 2015), the Healthy Aging at Work Symposium (TNO, 2013), the Annual Meeting of the Population Association of America (2013), and the Annual Meeting of the Gerontological Society of America (2014). During her PhD research, she organized the Dutch Demography Day in 2013 and she participated in educational programs, such as the Oslo Summer School on comparative welfare states and the ESA PhD workshop 'Long live the active'. Currently Ellen is working at NIDI as a post-doctoral researcher on the VICI-project "Aging workers in an aging society: Labor force transitions and work in late life", awarded to Prof. Kène Henkens.
