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Foreword

The year 2021 saw one highlight after another. No fewer than three new disciplines were added to the teaching portfolio of Campus Fryslân: MSc Voice Technology, the degree programme in Cultural Geography with the track Tourism, Geography & Planning and the specialization in Climate Adaptation Governance. Almost 360 students are currently following a degree programme at the Beurs location.

A memorable moment occurred in November 2021, when the Bachelor's degree programme in Global Responsibility & Leadership of University College Fryslân was awarded the 2022 Top Degree Programme predicate by the editors of the Keuzegids. This programme has been recognized as a top degree programme ever since its starting year, and this year it was even proclaimed to be the best of all the academic Bachelor's degree programmes in the Netherlands that were assessed. In terms of teaching, 2021 was concluded with a positive NVAO recommendation for the start of the Bachelor's degree programme in Data Science & Society.

The Graduate School grew to 47 PhD students in 2021. In the area of research, top-level achievements were made by both young and experienced researchers. Prof. Anne Beaulieu was appointed to the chair in Knowledge Infrastructures.

In September, former Secretary-General of the United Nations Ban Ki-moon and other international dignitaries visited Campus Fryslân to share expertise in the field of climate adaptation. This special visit attracted a lot of attention and was attended, inter alia, by member of the Executive Council of the Province of Fryslân Sietske Poepjes, Mayor of Leeuwarden Sybrand Buma, and Jouke de Vries and Cisca Wijmenga of the Board of the University of Groningen.

In 2021, BBO (Engbert Boneschansker) investigated the impact of Campus Fryslân in the region and concluded that the Faculty makes a solid and consistent contribution to the regional aims and knowledge infrastructure in the Province of Friesland.

We therefore proudly look back on a year in which staff and students made great efforts for the close-knit Campus Fryslân community and in which, together with many local, regional, national, and international partners, we worked with great devotion on providing high-quality academic teaching and research in the province of Friesland. And all of this was done despite the coronavirus pandemic and the ensuing challenges.

Academic teaching

As a consequence of the ongoing global coronavirus pandemic and the lockdown announced by the Dutch government, all teaching took place online between January and April 2021. The Campus Fryslân staff returned to organizing teaching on location as soon as the measures allowed for this, and despite all the organizational challenges involved, they succeeded in doing so while maintaining the required 1.5 metre social distancing.

From the very first day of the pandemic, all staff members were fully committed to the students, their learning process, and their wellbeing, even though they were faced with great challenges themselves. The students themselves also made every effort to make the best of the situation and to make sure that all Campus Fryslân students would get through it as best as possible. In April, we were delighted to be able to welcome the students back to the Beurs building and started offering hybrid classes, taught both on location and online, to enable everyone to participate in the best possible way.

Bachelor of Science

In addition to its own Bachelor's degree programme in Global Responsibility & Leadership, as well as a second Bachelor's degree programme currently under development, Data Science & Society, Campus Fryslân also offers accommodation to the first year of the Law degree programme of the Faculty of Law. The latter is becoming increasingly popular thanks to its new location in the Beurs building: it has grown from 28 students in 2018 to 49 students in 2021.

In September 2021, 75 new students started the degree programme. These students came from the Netherlands, Germany, Spain, Denmark, Poland, France, Estonia, Finland, Italy, Slovakia, Belgium, Botswana, Turkey, Lebanon, the United Kingdom, Japan, the United States, and Canada. They spent the first year living together on the Kanaalstraat in Leeuwarden, which proved to be very valuable, especially during the pandemic.

University College Fryslân/Global Responsibility & Leadership

The 2020-2021 academic year was concluded on a festive note with the graduation ceremony for the first cohort of Global Responsibility & Leadership students of University College Fryslân, which is part of the Campus Fryslân faculty. In 2018, this passionate group of students opted for a new degree programme that enabled them to study global challenges and search for local solutions. The knowledge and skills that our students acquire are recognized at both national and international levels. For example, students made contributions to the 26th United Nations *Climate Change Conference* in Glasgow.

In November, the BSc in Global Responsibility & Leadership was once again rewarded the Top Degree Programme predicate by the editors of the Keuzegids – just like every year since its starting year. The University College Fryslân degree programme has been in the top three right from the start. However, this year it was not only proclaimed the best of all University College degree programmes, but the best academic Bachelor's degree programme of the entire Netherlands!



Data Science & Society

In November 2021, Campus Fryslân received a positive recommendation from the NVAO (Accreditation Organisation of the Netherlands and Flanders) for the introduction of the Bachelor's degree programme in Data Science & Society. Students have been able to register for this new interdisciplinary degree programme, which uses data science to explain and solve societal issues, since mid-March 2022.

Sustainable Entrepreneurship

The MSc in Sustainable Entrepreneurship started in 2018 and welcomed 32 new students in the 2021-2022 academic year. The students have a lot of interaction with the field and they train their skills in various ways, for example in the Sustainable Start-Up Academy. In 2021, a variant of this Academy was developed, in which students of Sustainable Entrepreneurship work on business cases in teams together with PhD students from Wetsus, the European centre of excellence for sustainable water technology.

Graduates from universities of applied sciences can be admitted to the Master's degree programme upon completion of the 'hbo preparation course', which helps them to make the transition as smooth as possible. Experience has shown that these students successfully start and complete the Master's phase. In 2021, 15 students participated in the preparation course.

Master of Science

The University of Groningen/Campus Fryslân offers four Master's degree programmes::

- Sustainable Entrepreneurship (2018)
- Voice Technology (2021)
- Cultural Geography, Tourism, Geography & Planning (2021, track)
- Cultural Geography, Climate Adaptation Governance (2021, specialization)

In addition, we host the LLM degree programme in Governance and Law in Digital Society of the Faculty of Law and the MA in Multilingualism of the Faculty of Arts.

Voice Technology

The MSc in Voice Technology was accredited in January 2021, after which the programme could start recruiting students. The programme managed to recruit 22 students in this short recruitment period – registration closed on 1 May. The degree programme in Voice Technology attracts students from both the linguistics domain and more technical fields such as artificial intelligence and computing science. It is therefore a challenging programme, because students from different backgrounds have to achieve the same learning outcomes.

Cultural Geography: Climate Adaptation Governance

In addition to the Tourism, Geography & Planning track, students can also opt for the specialization in Climate Adaptation Governance. This new specialization was developed in 2021 in consultation with the Faculty of Spatial Sciences and with prominent partners such as the United Nations Climate Center on Adaptation. The former Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon honoured the Faculty with a visit in September. Thirteen students chose the new specialization, which we will be allowed to call a 'track' from 2022-2023..

Cultural Geography: Tourism, Geography & Planning

The MSc in Cultural Geography was offered by the Faculty of Spatial Sciences until the end of the 2020-2021 academic year. However, the Tourism, Geography & Planning track was already part of Campus Fryslân. Campus Fryslân officially took over the entire degree programme at the start of 2021-2022. Eight students registered for the Tourism, Geography & Planning track..

Academic research

The academic research conducted at the University of Groningen/Campus Fryslân is organized in a Graduate School for PhD students and a Research Institute for academic staff. Research is related to themes that are important to the region and also relevant at national and international levels.

Graduate School

The Graduate School of Campus Fryslân is an international community with PhD students from 18 different countries. In 2021, the number of PhD students was expanded to 47, including 11 external PhD students. The following table provides an overview of PhD students per research domain:

Research Institute

The Campus Fryslân Research Institute monitors the development of research fields, the research and data management policy of the Faculty, and internal/external research evaluations. UG/ Campus Fryslân has four research centres that conduct research: the Centre for Sustainable Entrepreneurship, the Data Research Centre, the Cyan Centre on Climate Change Adaptation, and the Centre for Internationalisation of Education.

Centre for Sustainable Entrepreneurship

The Centre for Sustainable Entrepreneurship (CSE) looks back on 2021 with pride and satisfaction. Despite the limitations caused by the pandemic, much new knowledge of and experience with sustainable entrepreneurship and circular economy was once again gained. Students of Sustainable Entrepreneurship participated in over 30 projects, for example in the fields of the clothing industry, recycling, tourism, mobility, energy systems, and culture. They wrote Master's theses for 21 different organizations, and four students started their own businesses based on insights that they acquired while writing their thesis.

In 2021, two PhD students successfully defended their research. Researchers from the CSE published many articles and started various new research projects on the theme of sustainability. Attention was also paid to life-long development. In addition to a lecture on sustainable business models for almost 200 entrepreneurs, a four-part masterclass entitled 'Successful entrepreneurship in a circular economy' was organized for 19 participants.

Data Research Centre

The Data Research Centre (DRC) works in an interdisciplinary way and combines expertise in the field of data science with critical insights in the fields of society and technology.

In 2021, the DRC successfully continued its research programme and made important contributions to themes such as data and privacy, online identity, crime, big data regulation, infrastructure for sustainability, and the consequences of software development, and supplied data to help achieve the *Sustainable Development Goals*.

The mid-term evaluation of the Orange Knowledge Programme on Cybersecurity, a collaboration between the Campus Fryslân Data Research Centre and the Center for Digital Society of the University of Gadjah Mada, Indonesia, took place in July. This positive evaluation offers good opportunities for jointly organizing a PhD programme.

The DRC is closely involved in technological innovations in higher education and regularly makes contributions at local, national, and international levels. Within Campus Fryslân, members of the DRC contributed to the development of the Bachelor's degree programme in Data Science & Society, which is led by Dr Oskar Gstrein. In addition, a contribution was made to the Minor in Data Wise, in which 45 students participated.

The DRC attaches great value to contact with stakeholders. For example, together with NHL Stenden University of Applied Sciences, it organized an international conference on Data and Public Order, which was attended by 350 participants, including representatives of municipalities and the national police. In addition, the members made contributions to various podcasts, such as the Campus Fryslân podcast 'Global Cast', and public lectures.

In 2021, Prof. Anne Beaulieu was appointed to the Aletta Jacobs Chair in *Knowledge Infrastructures*. Her book *Data Science and Society: A Critical Introduction* was published in 2021 (by Sage).

Cyan Centre on Climate Change Adaptation

The Cyan Centre on Climate Change Adaptation (C4A) was established in 2020. C4A aims to strengthen the teaching and research activities conducted in several research domains within the faculty, in particular the domain of Governance. The Centre conducts interdisciplinary research in the field of climate adaptation in collaboration with the regional, national, and international partners.

The following research and other projects were carried out in 2021:

Centre for Internationalisation of Education

The Centre for Internationalisation of Education (CIE) is a partnership between NHL Stenden University of Applied Sciences and Campus Fryslân. In 2021, seminars could unfortunately not be held on location as a consequence of the coronavirus pandemic. An online seminar was organized instead.

The CIE's first PhD student, Grada Okken, successfully completed her programme in 2021. Her thesis is entitled 'Beyond the welcome-back party. The long-term impact of study abroad on teacher behaviour'. This PhD thesis, as well as the work of other PhD students, indicates a broader perspective, in which internationalization in education is regarded as merely one of the sources of diversity. This may offer opportunities for acquiring the skills and attitudes that are needed to achieve intercultural contact by organizing a wider range of activities, including working in an interdisciplinary way. PhD students at the CIE are supervised by teams from different faculties.

Academic climate

The University of Fryslân attaches great value to organizing activities that promote the academic climate in Leeuwarden. In Campus Fryslân's vision, children should be progressively introduced to academia, starting from an early age. By promoting Leeuwarden as a city of knowledge and study, strengthening the academic climate will contribute to its appeal and reputation. The Municipality of Leeuwarden is supporting the reinforcement of the academic climate with a subsidy that can be used to organize activities.

Public events

In 2021, we presented a varied range of events, both on location and online. We have noticed that the reach of online activities is much bigger and that they attract a different audience, from far beyond the provincial borders. As a result, the number of participants in activities increased from 2,000 in 2020 to 3,600 in 2021.

The following activities were organized in 2021:

- Campus College, lectures by Campus Fryslân academics
- Global Cast, a podcast made by Campus Fryslân academics
- Campus Fryslân Experience, in which secondary school pupils follow a lecture and a seminar
- Weekend van de Wetenschap [science weekend]: an afternoon filled with academic activities for young and old
- A web class, in which secondary school pupils study online for four weeks
- Studium Generale Leeuwarden podcast
- Studium Generale Leeuwarden quiz
- Studium Generale lectures

We organize Studium Generale Leeuwarden (SGL) in collaboration with our partners Tresoar and NHL Stenden University of Applied Sciences. This network organization has its own website, which also lists activities from other organizations in order to help promote the entire range of informative lectures to a wide audience.

In 2021, UG/Campus Fryslân also organized the Campus Fryslân Science Prize for talented young academics. Dr Mirjam Günther-van der Meij (NHL Stenden University of Applied Sciences) won the 2021 Campus Fryslân Science Prize for her innovative research into good language teaching in classes where different languages are increasingly spoken. Dr Joëlle Swart (University of Groningen) was awarded second prize for her research on changing news usage, media wisdom, and digital literacy, and third prize went to Dr Ronald Plantinga (Fryske Akademy) for his PhD research on transitions in the dairy sector in Friesland.

Organizations from various countries have expressed interest in the interdisciplinary research and innovative teaching conducted at Campus Fryslân. For example, Prof. Masaharu Nomachi, director of the Osaka University European Center for Academic Initiatives, visited the faculty to explore the possibilities of collaboration in the field of research. In addition, Campus Fryslân and Prof. Amelia Hadfield together explored the possibilities of joining the University Global Partnership Network. Prof. Stephan Buse of the Hamburg University of Technology expressed his interest in adding the Campus Fryslân MSc degree programme in Sustainable Entrepreneurship to the teaching portfolio of their degree programme in Global Technology and Innovation Management & Entrepreneurship, thus enabling students to gain a double degree.

The first meeting of the Frisian alumni chapter of the University of Groningen was held at De Pleats (Burgum) on 13 October. During this event, Prof. Andrej Zwitter, Dean of the Campus Fryslân faculty, headed a panel discussion with University of Groningen Rector Magnificus Prof. Cisca Wijmenga, writer Maarten Huygen, and the Frisian entrepreneur and hospitality economist Geesje Duursma about the emancipation of women. The evening was opened by the Mayor of Leeuwarden, Sybrand Buma. The Frisian alumni chapter intends to organize an event for Frisian alumni every six months.

'Frisian alumni' in this context means all graduates from the University of Groningen who currently live in the province of Friesland. Needless to say, the Faculty also has its own alumni, both within the Netherlands and abroad, with whom we maintain contact in various different ways.



Business operations and consultative participation

In 2021, 37.0 FTE on average were deployed to establish UG/Campus Fryslân, including 20.8 FTE in academic staff and 16.2 FTE in support staff.

The academic staff is partly financed from the former UCF project Flankerend beleid Graduate school (continued by UG/CF) and partly via other revenue from direct and indirect government funding as well as contract research. The majority of the costs, however, is covered by the provincial long-term grant for 2016-

2023 for the Opbouw Campus Fryslân project. Staff for facility services/communication/events is partly funded from the Bevordering Academisch klimaat project, which is subsidized by the Municipality of Leeuwarden.
