#### SECTION 1 GENERAL PROVISIONS

## Article 1.1 - Applicability

These Teaching and Examination Regulations comprise a Part A and a Part B. This degree programme-specific Part B supplements Part A, which contains general stipulations for the teaching and examinations of the Bachelor's degree programmes taught at the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains stipulations that specifically concern the Bachelor's degree programme in **Arts**, **Culture and Media**.

### SECTION 2 QUALIFICATIONS

## Article 2.1 – Admission to the programme with profile requirement

Without prejudice to the provisions of Article 2.1. of Part A of these Teaching and Examination Regulations, the following supplementary requirements apply to this degree programme: N/A.

### Article 2.2 – Educational deficiencies

- 1. Deficiencies in educational qualifications in the subjects listed below may be compensated for by passing the relevant examinations at the level of the VWO final examination to the satisfaction of the Admissions Board: N/A.
- 2. Under certain circumstances, the Admissions Board can request a university lecturer in the relevant subject to arrange one or more tests.

## Article 2.3 - Language requirement for foreign certificates

Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 2.3 of Part A, the following additional requirement applies to this degree programme:

- 1. Students who have been admitted to a degree programme on the basis of a foreign certificate or degree may be required by the Admissions Board before registration to pass a Dutch language test, depending on the language of the chosen specialization, to be administered by an agency stipulated by the Board.
- 2. The Dutch language proficiency requirement can in any event be met by passing the state examination in Dutch as a Second Language (NT2-II).

## Article 2.4 - Starting date

Notwithstanding the provisions of Article 2.7 of Part A, the following additional requirement applies to this degree programme:

Students who have previously been enrolled in this degree programme or who wish to start in a higher year may apply to the Admissions Board for permission to start on a date other than 1 September. The Admissions Board will grant permission for an alternative starting date if the specific course units that the student in question wishes to follow start on this date and if the student has satisfied the entry requirement for these course units.

# Article 3.1 – Learning outcomes of the degree programme

# Article 3.2 - Language

- 1. Students can follow this degree program entirely in English. Some courses and seminars will be provided in Dutch for Dutch students. Manuals of course units will indicate when students can hand in assignments in Dutch.
- 2. The thesis/final assignment must be written in English or Dutch. A thesis/final assignment may only be written in a language other than English or Dutch if the Board of Examiners has given permission to do so.

## **Article 3.3 - Contact hours**

- 1. The propaedeutic phase of the degree programme comprises a minimum of 480 contact hours a year.

Not all courses in Modern and Contemporary Visual Arts and Literature are taught by the ACM department. The courses in Art History are taught by the department of History of Art and Architecture. The department of European Languages and Cultures teaches the Literature courses in the second year, semesters IA, IB and IIA. The other courses (in year one, semester IIA and IIB, and in the second year, semester IIB) are offered by the ACM department

All course units are listed in the online course catalogue OCASYS.

- 2. The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus for each individual course unit and the Assessment Plan for the degree programme.
- 3. In situations of force majeure, when it is not reasonably possible to provide teaching in the manner stated in OCASYS, alternative modes of instruction and assessment may temporarily be used. This is on condition that the prescribed learning outcomes are still achieved upon completion of the degree programme.

- <sup>2</sup> Students choose one of the two profession-oriented specializations.
- <sup>3</sup> These course units are taught in English. If possible, seminars in Dutch will be provided for Dutch-speaking students.
- <sup>4</sup> All ACM students follow Arts in Practice in their third year focusing on their first art discipline (Film, Music, or Theatre, courses 10 and 12 in the first year). Students who have chosen literature or Modern and Contemporary Visual Arts as their second art discipline (course 11 and 13 in the first year) can opt to replace this course unit by an appropriate unit (or units) in Literature or Modern and Contemporary Visual Arts, provided the learning outcomes of these modules match those of Arts in Practice. A list of course units meeting these requirements will be made available at the beginning of the second semester. Students should ask permission to the Board of Examiners prior to following the substitute course units.
- 2. The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus for each individual course unit and the Assessment Plan for the degree programme.
- 3. In situations of force majeure, when it is not reasonably possible to provide teaching in the manner stated in OCASYS, alternative modes of instruction and assessment may temporarily be used. This is on condition that the prescribed learning outcomes are still achieved upon completion of the degree programme.

## SECTION 7 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

## **Article 7.1 – Amendments**

- 1. Any amendments to Part A of these Regulations will, following the recommendation by and/or upon the approval of the Faculty Council, be confirmed by the Faculty Board in a separate decree.
- 2. Any amendments to Part B of these Regulations will, following the recommendation by and/or upon the approval of the Programme Committee and the Faculty Council be confirmed by the Faculty Board in a separate decree.
- 3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
- 4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.

# **Article 7.2 - Publication**

- 1. The Faculty Board will duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
- 2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 7.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via the Student Portal.

# **Article 7.3 – Date of commencement**

These Regulations will take effect on 1 September 2022.

These Regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 12 July 2022 and approved by the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee where required on.
