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Section 1 General provisions

Article 1.1 – Applicability

These Teaching and Examination Regulations comprise a Part A and a Part B. This degree programme-specific Part B complements Part A, which contains general provisions which apply to the teaching, examinations and final assessments of the Master's degree programmes provided by the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains stipulations that specifically concern the Master's degree programme in **Classics and Ancient Civilizations**.

Section 2 Admission

Article 2.1 – Entry requirements

1. Students with a Dutch or foreign certificate of higher education that indicates that they have knowledge and understanding of and subject-specific skills in either Greek and Latin languages and cultures, in ancient history, in classical and Mediterranean archaeology and/or in ancient philosophy at academic Bachelor's level will be admitted to the degree programme.
2. Holders of a Bachelor's degree certificate in Classical Studies, History or Archaeology of the University of Groningen or from another Dutch university are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in article 2.1.1 and will be admitted to both tracks of the degree programme on that basis.
3. Holders of a Bachelor's degree certificate of the Faculty of Arts of the University of Groningen, other than mentioned in articles 2.1.2 and 2.1.3, with a 30 ECTS premaster minor Classics and Ancient Civilization, are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in articles 2.1.1 and 2.1.3 and will be admitted to the degree programme on that basis.
4. If a candidate does not have a Bachelor's degree certificate, the Admissions Board must assess whether he/she can be admitted based on the possession of knowledge, understanding and skills at Bachelor's level.

Article 2.2 – Language requirements for students with foreign qualifications

1. Students who have been admitted to the degree programme on the basis of a foreign certificate or degree may be required by the Board of Examiners to pass an English language test before registration, to be held by an agency stipulated by the Board of Examiners.
2. The English language proficiency requirement can be met by passing an examination in English at the level of the VWO final exam or by passing the TOEFL iBT with a score of at least 90, with a minimum score of 21 on each individual part, or an IELTS score of 6.5, with a minimum score of 6.0 on each individual part. TOEFL tests taken after 21 January 2026 will use TOEFL's new 1-6 scoring system with a minimum overall score of 4.5 (min. 4 in reading and speaking, min. 4.5 in listening and writing)
3. LanguageCert Academic: overall score 70 (min. 65 in every category)
4. Pearson PTE Academic: overall score 66 (min. 62 in Reading and Writing, and 54 in Listening and Speaking)

Article 2.3 Admission to the Master's tracks

There are no additional admission requirements applying to the various tracks in this Master's degree programme. Within the track classics, however, there are mandatory courses that are only open to students who in the opinion of the Board of Examiners have sufficient command of Greek and Latin. Students with a Bachelor's degree in Classical Studies satisfy this condition.

Section 3 Content and structure of the degree programme

Article 3.1 – Student workload

1. The student workload of the degree programme is 60 ECTS credit points.
2. The student workload is expressed in whole ECTS credit points.

Article 3.3 – Language

1. The degree programme is taught in English.
2. Notwithstanding Article 3.3.1, one or more course units of the programme may be taught in Dutch in line with the University of Groningen Code of Conduct: Languages Used in Teaching and Examinations.

3. The thesis/final assignment must be written in Dutch or English. A thesis/final assignment may only be written in a different language if the Board of Examiners has given permission to do so.

Article 5.1 – Amendments

and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision

2. Any amendments to part B of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.

Article 5.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board will duly publish these Regulations, the Rules and Regulations formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 5.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via ‘My University’.

Article 5.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations will take effect on 1 September 2026.

These regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 23 June 2026, with approval from the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee for the sections requiring this by law.
