Section 1 General provisions

Article 1.1 - Applicability

These Regulations comprise three parts – Part A and Part B and Part C.

- Part A contains general provisions which apply to the teaching, examinations and final assessments of the Master's degree programmes provided by the Faculty of Arts of the University of Groningen, hereinafter referred to as the Faculty.
- Part B contains degree programme-specific provisions which apply to the degree programme in European Studies, Master's track Euroculture, Croho 60847, hereinafter referred to as the degree programme, as provided by the Faculty of Arts of the University of Groningen.
- Part C contains the Study and Examination Regulations of the Joint Master's Programme in Euroculture as jointly established under the framework of the "Consortium Agreement for the Establishment of a Joint Master's Degree Programme in Euroculture", hereinafter referred to as the Consortium Agreement, to which the University of Groningen is signatory, and which applies to the aforementioned degree programme of the Faculty of Arts of the University of Groningen. Additional agreements and amendments concluded under the framework of the Consortium Agreement, including related bilateral agreements, are considered part and parcel of the Consortium Agreement in these regulations.

Due to the specific joint nature of this degree programme, the following order of precedence applies for students registered for the degree programme at the University of Groningen, insofar stipulations may contradict each other:

- The Dutch Higher Education Research Act (WHW) takes precedence over
- The Consortium Agreement, which takes precedence over
- Part C of these regulations, which takes precedence over
- Part B of these regulations, which takes precedence over
- Part A of these regulations.

Article 1.2 - Definitions

Due to the specific joint nature of the degree programme, the following definitions in article 1.2 of Part A of these regulations shall be read and understood as follows:

- Student: a person registered at the University of Groningen for the purpose of taking course units and/or examinations leading to the conferral of a university degree. Students from partner universities who study at the University of Groningen as part of the Consortium Agreement shall have the same rights as students in the preceding definition.
- ECTS credit point: a credit point within the meaning of the Dutch Higher Education and Research Act. The student workload of each course unit is expressed in ECTS credit points, whereby 1 ECTS is equivalent to a student workload of 28 hours for courses taught at the University of Groningen in accordance with article 7.4 of the Act. ECTS credit points awarded by other partner universities under the Consortium Agreement shall represent a student workload equivalent to what the respective national legislation stipulates.
- Semester: part of the academic year, either starting on 1 September and ending on a date to be determined by the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors as mandated through the Consortium Agreement by the Board of the University, or starting on a date determined by the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors as mandated through the Consortium Agreement by the Board of the University and ending on 31 August.
- Board of Examiners: an independent body with the duties and powers as stated in articles 7.11, 7.12, 7.12b, 7.12c of the Dutch Higher Education and Research Act, including assessing whether the requirements of the final assessment have been met. The Board of Examiners at the University of Groningen has delegated authority from the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors, which functions as the joint Board of Examiners on Consortium level, to make decisions in relation to the implementation of assessment standards, the Teaching and Examination Regulations in place at the University of Groningen, and other related issues under the Dutch Higher Education and Research Act, insofar as they regard situations within the sphere of the University of Groningen and do not have direct bearing upon the wider cooperation within the consortium. Concerning matters that have wider implications for the consortium, the Euroculture Board of Examiners at the University of Groningen is required to at least consult or otherwise pass the matter on to the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors at Consortium level.
- Admissions Board: the board that has decision-making powers in matters concerning admission to the degree programme on behalf of the Faculty Board. As the Consortium

Agreement stipulates that admission to the degree programme is at the discretion of the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors, the Admissions Board at the University of Groningen, functions as the local Selection Committee, representing and answering to the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors in agreement with the Study and Examination Regulations in Part C of these regulations.

Section 2 Admission

Article 2.1 - Entry requirements

1. Students with a Dutch or foreign certificate of higher education that indicates that they have satisfied the following admission criteria shall be admitted to the degree programme:
 1. university Bachelor's degree from an Arts, Humanities or Social Sciences programme, which equals a first cycle of a European research university¹
 2. sufficient knowledge of English to be able to follow the degree programme successfully, certified by a formal test or a proven record of acquisition (see Article 2.3.2)
 3. demonstrated evidence of academic writing skills to follow and finish the degree programme successfully.

Article 2.2 - Admissions Board

Due to the specific joint nature of the degree programme, the first clause of article 2.3 of Part A of these regulations shall be read and understood as follows:

1. The Euroculture Master's Board of Directors shall have the power to decide on behalf of the Faculty Board in matters concerning admission to the degree programme. The Admissions Board shall function as the local Selection Committee as meant by article 4.3.1 of Part C of these regulations.
2. As stipulated in article 4.3. of Part C of these regulations, the admissions board consists of at least two members. The chairperson of the local Admissions Board of the Euroculture Programme in Groningen, is preferably the Director of Studies of the degree programme or another colleague teaching in the programme. The Admissions Board will appoint a secretary from among its members.

Article 2.3 - Language requirement for foreign certificates

1. Students who have been admitted to this degree programme will be asked by the Admissions Board – before registration – to show proof of their English proficiency. This proof needs to be administered by an agency stipulated by the Admissions Board.
2. The English language proficiency requirement will be met by passing the TOEFL iBT with a score of 93, or an IELTS score of 6,5 with no part (listening, reading, writing, speaking) scoring below 6.5, or Cambridge CAE (C1) or CPE (C2) according to the CEFR. These results may not be older than 5 years. Students may apply for exemption from this condition to the Board of Examiners for the Euroculture degree programme.

Article 2.4 – Admission to Master's tracks

In addition to the provisions of Article 2.1, the following admission requirements apply to the various Master's tracks in this degree programme: N/A

Article 2.5 - Admission Documents

Students register online at www.euroculturemaster.eu for the admissions procedure by submitting the following documents:

- certificate of an English language proficiency test (see Article 2.3.2)
- certified BA or MA degree certificate in one of the disciplines listed under Article 2.1.1a
- certified list of marks
- registration form for the degree programme
- motivation for the degree programme (max. 1 page)
- two letters of recommendation
- curriculum vitae
- one passport photo
- photocopy of passport
- proof of academic writing

¹ Students with other qualifications can be admitted at the discretion of the Admissions Board as stated in the Entry

Article 2.6 - Admissions procedure for the degree programme

1. Bearing in mind the admissions procedure for the degree programme within the meaning of Article 2.1.1, the Admissions Board shall assess the knowledge and skills of the candidate. The Admissions Board will assess the written documentation and determine whether the prospective student can be admitted directly to the programme. In addition to the certified written proofs of degree programme(s) already followed, the Board may ask experts from within or outside the University to test certain areas of knowledge and skills. Rejected candidates may appeal. In the event of an appeal, the Admissions Board may reconsider its decision on the basis of additional and new information.
2. Students who have not yet obtained their BA degree at the time of the selection procedure but who would normally do so before the Master's degree programme begins, may be granted provisional admission. Students must submit a declaration from the relevant Board of Examiners that they have satisfied the requirements of a BA degree before 1 September.

Article 2.7 - Admission procedure: times

1. There are two deadlines per year for applying to the degree programme.
2. Students who wish to apply to the degree program and, if applicable, for a scholarship should submit their applications by 10 January of the year the program begins, using the online application system. Applications from self-funded students are accepted on a rolling basis until the final deadline of 1 May. Only in exceptional cases will the Admissions Board consider an application submitted after 1 May. There is no guarantee that applications will be dealt with in time if they are submitted after this date, however.
3. Admission will be on condition that the candidate has satisfied the requirements set out in Article 2.1 concerning knowledge and skills by the starting date of the degree programme at the latest, supported by certificates from the degree programmes followed. The written admission decision will include information for the student about the possibility of an appeal to the Board of Appeal for Examinations.

Article 2.8 - Limited numbers

1. According to the Consortium regulations, each partner institution may admit a limited number of students (25) to the first semester of the degree programme.
2. The Admissions Board will create a ranking order in the applications on the basis of the selection criteria listed in Article 2.1.1.
3. The Admissions Board will issue proofs of admission in the order of its own ranking list.

Section 3 Content and structure of the degree programme

Article 3.1 – Student workload

1. The degree programme has a student workload of 120 ECTS whereby one credit is the equivalent of 28 hours of study for course units followed at the University of Groningen.
2. The student workload is expressed in whole ECTS credit points.

Article 3.2 – Learning outcomes of the degree programme

Graduates from the Euroculture programme possess a critical and contextual understanding of European identity, society and integration processes, alongside advanced analytical and interpretative skills to engage with (changing) societal challenges, and demonstrate expertise in problem-solving and future-oriented knowledge applications in diverse academic, professional and intercultural contexts.

Upon graduation they have obtained the following learning outcomes:

- The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus of each individual course unit and the assessment plan of the degree programme.
- In situations of force majeure, when it is not reasonably possible to provide teaching in the manner stated in OCASYS, alternative modes of instruction and assessment may temporarily be used. This is on condition that the prescribed learning outcomes are still achieved upon completion of the degree programme

Article 3.5 - Course units completed elsewhere

Due to the specific joint nature of the degree programme and in conformity with the Consortium Agreement and the Dutch Higher Education and Research Act, article 3.4 of Part A of these regulations shall be read and understood in its entirety as follows:

- A Joint Master's degree can only be awarded by the University of Groningen if at least a substantial part of the course units of the degree programme were followed at the University of Groningen.
- A substantial part of the course units as meant in the previous clause is considered:
 - 30 ECTS of the degree programme followed at the University of Groningen and
 - the thesis is jointly supervised with the University of Groningen.

Section 4 Tests and examinations of the degree programme

Article 4.1 – General

- The language of instruction and assessment for the components of the degree programme taught at the University of Groningen is English.
- The results of tests and examinations are given as pass or fail, in numbers on a scale of 1 to 10, expressed as 5.5 or more for a pass and less than 5.5 for a failure.
- The results of tests and examinations achieved at the partner universities under the Consortium Agreement shall be converted, and vice versa, in accordance with the conversion table in the annex of Part C of these regulations.

Article 4.2 – Board of Examiners and examiners

- Due to the specific joint nature of the degree programme, the first, second and fifth clause of article 4.2 of Part A of these regulations shall be read and understood as follows:
- The Board of Examiners is the independent body that determines whether individual students have the knowledge, understanding and skills required to be awarded the degree. In the degree programme, the Euroculture Master's Board of Directors functions as the joint Board of Examiners of the Consortium (chaired by a scholar from the Consortium who is not a Director of Studies) in accordance with article 4.1 of Part C of these regulations, and the Board of Examiners at the University of Groningen ('Examencommissie') functions as the local examination board as defined by article 4.2 of Part C of these regulations.
- The Faculty Board shall appoint the members of local board of Examiners of Euroculture on the basis of their expertise in the field of the degree programme. In accordance with article 1.2 of Part C of these regulations, the Director of Studies is the chairperson.
- The Board of Examiners of Euroculture at the University of Groningen shall appoint examiners to set examinations and determine results concerning assessments taking place at the University of Groningen. The Board of Examiners at the University of Groningen shall automatically accept and recognize examiners of partner universities to set examinations and determine results as regards assessments at the partner universities under the Consortium Agreement and in agreement with the procedures and rules in force at the partner universities concerning the appointment of examiners.

Article 4.3 – Compulsory order

The examinations for the course units listed below may not be taken before the examinations for the associated course units have been passed:

- The student can only commence with second semester Euroculture modules after having passed successfully first semester Euroculture modules with a total load of 20 ECTS credits.
- The student can only commence with third semester modules after having passed successfully all first semester Euroculture modules and 20 out of 30 ECTS-credits of second semester Euroculture

modules. The student can only commence with fourth semester Euroculture modules, that is no. 12 *Eurocompetences III* and no. 13. *MA Thesis Euroculture: research and writing* after having passed all first and second semester modules successfully, as well as having passed module no. 9. *MA Thesis Euroculture: initial research*.

Article 4.4 - MA Placement

A work placement internship plan comprising a list of the characteristics of the placement and a plan of activities must be drawn up before the placement commences. This plan must be approved by the supervisor of the placement providing organisation and by the Board of Examiners in Groningen (examencommissie). The final assessment of the placement will be by the supervisor from the degree programme after taking into account the assessment by the supervisor from the placement providing institution and the self-evaluation report by the student.

Article 4.5. - MA Thesis

1. The MA thesis will be assessed by two examiners appointed by the Board of Examiners. One of the examiners will be a member of the academic staff of a partner university participating in the Euroculture Erasmus Mundus Consortium. Supervision and assessment will be conducted in line with the 'Thesis Guidelines' compiled by the Consortium.
2. A student who is following two degree programmes must submit a separate thesis for each programme. (see also Article 4.11, number 1 of part A of these Regulations).
3. The thesis must be written in English.

SECTION 5 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 5.1 – Amendments

1. Any amendments to part A of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
2. Any amendments to part B of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.
5. In the event of changes to the curriculum, assessment formats, or other components governed by these Regulations, appropriate transitional arrangements will be determined to reasonably protect the interests and study progress of students already enrolled. For the Euroculture programme, the transitional arrangements will be introduced at consortium level by the Euroculture Consortium apply and will be followed; where necessary, additional faculty-level arrangements will be established to align with and implement these consortium provisions.

Article 5.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board shall duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 5.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via the 'Student Portal'.

Article 5.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations shall take effect on **1 September 2026**.

These Regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 23 June 2026 and approved by the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee where required.
