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Section 1 General provisions

Article 1.1 – Applicability

These Regulations comprise two parts – Part A and Part B. This is the degree programme-specific Part B to complement Part A, which contains general provisions which apply to the teaching, examinations and final assessments of the Master's degree programmes provided by the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains stipulations that specifically concern the Master's degree programme in **Middle Eastern Studies**.

Section 2 – Admission

Article 2.1 – Entry requirements

1. Students with a Dutch or foreign certificate of higher education that indicates that they have knowledge and understanding of, and subject-specific skills in, Middle Eastern Studies at an academic Bachelor's level will be admitted to the degree programme.
2. Holders of a certificate from the Bachelor's degree programme in *Middle Eastern Studies* from the University of Groningen or from another Dutch university are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in Article 2.1.1 and will be admitted to the degree programme on that basis.
3. Holders of a certificate from a Bachelor's degree programme of a Humanities/Arts or Law Faculty of a Dutch University other than that listed in Article 2.1.2, who have completed the Faculty Minor in Middle-Eastern Studies at the University of Groningen, are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in Article 2.1.1 and will be admitted to the degree programme on that basis.
4. If a student does not have a Bachelor's degree as mentioned in Article 2.1.2 or Article 2.1.3, the Admissions Board is responsible for investigating whether the candidate can be admitted on basis of their knowledge, understanding and general level equivalent to that of a Bachelor's degree as mentioned in Article 2.1.2 or Article 2.1.3.

Article 2.2 – Language requirement for foreign certificates

1. Students who have been admitted to the degree programme on the basis of a foreign certificate or degree may be required by the Board of Examiners to pass an English language test before registration, to be held by an agency stipulated by the Board of Examiners.
2. The English language proficiency requirement can be met by passing an examination in English at the level of the VWO final exam or by passing the TOEFL iBT with a score of at least 90 (with a minimum score of 21 on each individual part) or an IELTS score of 6.5 (with a minimum score of 6.0 on each individual part). TOEFL tests taken after 21 January 2026 will use TOEFL's new 1-6 scoring system with a minimum overall score of 4.5 (min. 4 in reading and speaking, min. 4.5 in listening and writing)
3. LanguageCert Academic: overall score 70 (min. 65 in every category)
4. Pearson PTE Academic: overall score 66 (min. 62 in Reading and Writing, and 54 in Listening and Speaking)

Article 2.3 Admission to the Master's tracks

In addition to the provisions of Article 2.1, the following admission requirements apply to the various tracks in this Master's degree programme:

A Bachelor's degree in Middle Eastern Studies (UG), History, International Relations/International Organization, Religious Studies, American Studies, European Languages and Cultures Studies- Track Politics and Society (RUG) ensures no-threshold access to this Master's degree programme.

Holders of an academic Bachelor's degree of an Arts/Humanities, Social Sciences or Law Faculty from a Dutch University will be admitted to the Master's degree programme after completing the Faculty minor in Middle Eastern Studies. Holders of an academic Bachelor's degree in a field relevant to the Master's degree programme that do not comply with the above conditions may be admitted upon explicit approval of the Admissions Board of the degree programme. The Admissions Board will assess whether the programme followed and the level of the Bachelor's degree obtained are sufficient in order to be able to participate in the Master's degree programme in Middle Eastern Studies.

Section 3 Content and structure of the degree programme

Article 3.1 – Student workload

1. The student workload of the degree programme is 60 ECTS.
2. The student workload is expressed in whole ECTS credit points.

Article 3.2 Learning outcomes of the degree programme

Article 3.3 – Medium of Instruction

2. The thesis/final assignment must be written in Dutch or English. The thesis/final assignment may only be written in a language other than Dutch or English if the Board of Examiners has given permission to do so.

1. The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus of each individual course unit and the assessment plan of the degree programme.
2. In situations of force majeure, when it is not reasonably possible to provide teaching in the manner stated in OCASYS, alternative modes of instruction and assessment may temporarily be used. This is on condition that the prescribed learning outcomes are still achieved upon completion of the degree programme.

SECTION 5 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 5.1 – Amendments

1. Any amendments to part A of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
2. Any amendments to part B of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, the Board of Examiners may not take any decisions under these regulations that would be to the disadvantage of students.

Article 5.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board will duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 5.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website through the Student Portal.

Article 5.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations will take effect on 1 september 2026.

These Regulations were decreed by the Board of the Faculty of Arts on 23 June 2026 and approved by the Faculty Council and the Programme Committee where required.
