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Section 1 General provisions

Article 1.1 – Applicability

These Regulations comprise two parts – Part A and Part B. This degree programme-specific Part B accompanies Part A, which contains general provisions which apply to the teaching, examinations and final assessments of the Master's degree programmes provided by the Faculty of Arts, hereinafter referred to as **the Faculty**. Part B contains degree programme-specific provisions which apply to the degree programme in **American Studies**

Section 2 Admission

Article 2.1 – Entry requirements

1. Students with a Dutch or foreign certificate of higher education that indicates that they have acquired the following knowledge, skills and attitudes shall be admitted to the degree programme: knowledge and understanding of and subject-specific skills in American Studies at Bachelor's degree level.
2. Holders of a certificate from the Bachelor's degree programme in American Studies of the University of Groningen or from another Dutch university are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in Article 2.1.1 and will be admitted to the degree programme on that basis.
3. Holders of a certificate from the Bachelor's degree programme in
 - History
 - Media Studies
 - English Language and Culture
 - Arts, Culture and Media
 - International Relations and International Organisation
 - Art History
 - Middle Eastern Studies
 - European Languages and Cultures
 - Archaeology
 - Greek and Latin Language and Cultureof the University of Groningen with a premaster minor North American Studies are expected to have the knowledge, understanding and skills listed in article 2.1.1 and will be admitted to the degree programme on that basis.
4. The Admissions Board is responsible for assessing whether students with or without a Bachelor's degree are admissible on the basis of sufficient knowledge, understanding and skills at the level of a Bachelor's degree.

Article 2.2 – Language requirements for foreign certificates

1. Students who have been admitted to a degree programme on the basis of a foreign certificate or degree may be asked by the Board of Examiners – before registration – to pass an English language test, to be administered by an agency stipulated by the Board.
2. The English language proficiency requirement will be met by passing an examination in English at the level of the Dutch VWO final exam, or by passing the TOEFL internet-based test with a score of at least 100, with a minimum score for speaking and writing of 25 (each), or an IELTS score of at least 7.0 (with a minimum of 6.5 for all components). TOEFL tests taken after 21 January 2026 will use TOEFL's new 1-6 scoring system with a minimum overall score of 5 (min. 5 in speaking and writing)
3. LanguageCert Academic: overall score 75 (min. 70 in all categories)
4. Pearson PTE Academic: overall score 71 (min. 64 in Reading, 58 in Listening and Speaking, 70 in Writing)

Article 2.3 – Admission to Master’s tracks

In addition to the provisions of Article 2.1, the following admission requirements apply to the various Master’s tracks specializations in this degree programme: n/a

Section 3 Content and structure of the degree programme

Article 3.1 – Student workload

1. The degree programme has a student workload of 60 ECTS.
2. The student workload is expressed in whole ECTS credit points.

** Students have the option to replace one MA Seminar with an Internship, which is relevant to the nature and level of the degree programme.

*** Pending availability of exchange places and eligibility, students have the option of spending one semester at one of the institutions in the Americas with which the degree programme has a formal exchange agreement.

Students doing course work in North America will fulfill the program requirements by acquiring a total of 10 ECTS in the US. For visa purposes, they need to complete the equivalent of 3 research seminars at 400 level or higher. However, the additional 20 ECTS accrued (necessary to maintain full-time student status in the US) are “extra” credits that will be listed in the diploma supplement, but are not required for graduating from our program. NOTE: The Study Abroad option makes it impossible to finish the program in one year; it will, in fact, add an additional semester to the nominal duration of the program.

All course units are listed in the online course catalogue OCASYS.

1. The modes of instruction and assessment for the course units listed above are set out in the syllabus of each individual course unit and the assessment plan of the degree programme.
2. In situations of force majeure, when it is not reasonably possible to provide teaching in the manner stated in OCASYS, alternative modes of instruction and assessment may temporarily be used. This is on condition that the prescribed learning outcomes are still achieved upon completion of the degree programme.

SECTION 5 TRANSITIONAL AND FINAL PROVISIONS

Article 5.1 – Amendments

1. Any amendments to part A of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
2. Any amendments to part B of these Regulations will, following a recommendation by and/or subject to the approval of the Programme Committee and in consultation with – and where necessary subject to the approval of – the Faculty Council, be adopted by the Faculty Board in a separate decision.
3. Any amendments to these Regulations will not apply to the current academic year, unless it may reasonably be assumed that the amendment in question will not harm the interests of students.
4. In addition, an amendment may not influence any other decision concerning a student taken by the Board of Examiners under these Regulations to the disadvantage of students.

Article 5.2 – Publication

1. The Faculty Board shall duly publish these Regulations, any rules and guidelines formulated by the Board of Examiners, and any amendments to these documents.
2. Copies of the documents referred to in Article 5.2.1 are available from the Faculty Office. These documents can also be found on the Faculty website via the Student Portal.

Article 5.3 – Date of commencement

These Regulations shall take effect on 1 september 2026.
