'Good Morals in Greek Private Law'

The importance the Greek legislator gives to good morals can be specially traced in the field of the law of obligations as well as in the field of tort law. In the field of the law of obligations it is stipulated that all juridical acts (unilateral, such as a wills, or contracts) contrary to good morals are null and void (art.178 Greek Civil Code). In the field of tort law it is stipulated that whoever causes prejudice to another intentionally and in a manner contrary to good morals is obliged to compensate said other person (art. 919 GCC).
